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The following List of Vessels contains the names of all vessels registered in the district of Gloucester above five tons burthen on October 1, 1904, giving their rig, gross and net tonnage, length, breadth and depth, as they appear on the official certificates of enrolment, also when and where built and the names of their owners, managing owners or fitters. All are schooners unless otherwise designated.

For more conveniently showing the vessels which are owned in the various sections of the district, they are given under the head of each section, although included in the general list, which includes the statistics of the vessels owned at Gloucester Harbor only.

The usual summary of the vessels registered in the district and of each port in the district, is also given, giving the total gross and net tonnage and the average gross and net tonnage of each rig, with a list of the new vessels and those added by purchase from other ports during the year, and the vessels transferred to other ports by sale or otherwise; also the record of vessels and men lost during the year, with a tabulation of the losses in the fisheries from this port since 1830, and a list of the vessels fitted out by each firm or outfitter.

A list of the fishing vessels owned at the principal New England fishing ports outside of Gloucester, including Boston, Beverly, Salem, Provincetown, Portsmouth, Portland, Boothbay Harbor, Bucksport, and also New York, with the losses in the fisheries from each port so far as reported, is also appended, together with other matter of interest.

TONNAGE STATISTICS.

The total number of vessels of all descriptions registered in the District of Gloucester October 1, 1904, was 350, with a total measurement of 28,100.78 tons gross and 21,065.65 tons net, a decrease of 14 vessels and 791.63 tons gross and 427.22 tons net from last year, when a total of 364 vessels, aggregating 28,892.51 tons gross and 21,492.87 tons net were registered. During the preceding year an increase of two vessels was made, but a decrease of tonnage of 317.20 tons gross and 242.42 tons net was shown.

Of the different sections of the district, Gloucester Harbor shows a decrease of 11 vessels, aggregating 919.93 tons gross and 355.61 tons net, Rockport (including Pigeon Cove) a decrease of two vessels, with 66.39 tons gross and 62.23 tons net, and Manchester a decrease of one vessel, 9.87 tons gross and 9.38 tons net. The tonnage of Lanesville and Annisquam remaining the same.

The average gross tonnage of the district is increased from 79.38 tons to 80.29 tons and the average net tonnage from 59.04 tons to 60.19 tons. The average gross tonnage of the schooners in the district is increased from 96.37 tons to 100.15 tons and the net tonnage from 71.27 to 71.32 tons, the average tonnage of the auxiliary schooners remains at 130.79 tons gross and 83.21 tons net; the average tonnage of the sloops is decreased from 73.82 to 72.60; the average tonnage of the schooner boats is increased from 15.18 tons to 15.73 tons gross and from 12.38 to 12.86 tons net; the average tonnage of the sloop boats is increased from 12.11 tons to 12.19 tons gross and 11.20 tons to 11.39 tons net; the average tonnage of the steamers is decreased from 89.37 tons to 72.53 tons gross and 57.88 tons to 46.22 tons net; and the average tonnage of the barges is decreased from 155.20 tons to 119.06 tons gross and from 145.82 tons to 112.03 tons net.

The average tonnage of Gloucester Harbor is increased from 82.37 tons to 82.67 tons gross and from 60.40 tons to 61.14 tons net; that of Rockport (including Pigeon Cove) increased from 67.61 to 69.63 tons gross and from 58.65 tons to 61.41 tons net; Annisquam and Lanesville remain the same, while Manchester shows an increase in average tonnage from 12.37 tons to 13.62 tons gross and from 11.75 tons to 12.94 tons net.

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The total number of vessels added to the fleet in 1903 was 28, with a total measurement of 1997.63 tons gross and 1493.54 tons net, and an average tonnage of 70.92 tons gross and 53.34 tons net, of which 20 vessels, aggregating 1525.07 tons gross and 1065.42 tons net, and averaging 76.25 tons gross and 53.27 tons net, were built during the year, and eight vessels, aggregating 472.56 tons gross and 428.12 tons net, and averaging 59.07 tons gross and 53.51 tons net, were added by purchase from other ports.

The total number of vessels added to the fleet in 1902 was 34, aggregating 2,957.62 tons gross and 2,006.52 tons net and averaging 86.99 tons gross and 58.43 tons net, of which 28 vessels, aggregating 2,789.13 tons gross and 1,955.27 tons net, averaging 99.61 tons gross and 69.86 tons net, were built during the year, and six vessels aggregating 168.49 tons gross, and 151.25 tons net, and averaging 28.08 tons gross and 25.21 tons net, were added by purchase from other ports.

The total number of vessels added to the fleet in 1901 was 36, with a total tonnage of 2,793.86 tons gross and 2,087.38 tons net, and an average tonnage of 77.61 tons gross and 57.98 tons net, of which 27, aggregating 2,449.12 tons gross and 1,787.61 tons net and averaging 90.71 tons gross and 66.21 tons net, were built during the year, and nine vessels, aggregating 324.74 tons gross and 309.77 tons net, and averaging 36.08 tons gross and 34.42 tons net, were added by purchase from other ports.

Previous to 1897 the net tonnage as shown above was arrived at by an arbitrary deduction of five per cent. from the gross tonnage, but since the year named, the actual space occupied by quarters for the crew or not otherwise available for cargo purposes has been deducted in estimating the net tonnage.

Vessels Sold from the District.

Twenty-six vessels, with a total measurement of 1507.39 tons gross and 1109.95 tons net and an average tonnage of 65.54 tons gross and 48.26 tons net have been sold to other ports during the year. The vessels sold from the district include 15 schooners, with a total measurement of 1333.12 tons gross and 1004.18 tons net, one sloop, 37.91 tons gross, 36.05 tons net, two schooner boats, with a total measurement of 16.36 tons gross and 15.49 tons net, and five sloop boats with a total aggregate tonnage of 70 tons gross and 54.23 tons net.

One vessel, sch. Flying Cloud, 23.28 tons gross, 22.12 tons net, built in Kennebunkport in 1862, has been condemned and broken up, and one vessel, sloop boat Agawan, 7.55 tons gross, 7.18 tons net, has been remeasured and falls below the limit of five tons above which vessels are registered.

The number of vessels sold from the District the preceding year was 20, with a total measurement of 1579.08 tons gross and 1,221.22 tons net, and an average measurement of 78.95 tons gross and 61.06 tons net, have been sold to other ports during the year, of which eight were schooners, with a total measurement of 881.86 tons gross and 564.80 tons net and an average tonnage of 80.17 tons gross and 51.37 tons net, one sloop, 63.05 tons gross and 59.90 tons net, one sloop boat, 6.82 tons gross and 6.48 tons net, two auxiliary schooner boats, with a total measurement of 50.25 tons gross and 23.64 tons net and an average measurement of 25.13 tons gross and 11.82 tons net, two steamers, with a total tonnage of 77.36 tons gross and 38.69 tons net and an average tonnage of 38.68 tons gross and 19.34 tons net, and three barges, with an aggregate tonnage of 500.74 tons gross and 430.61 tons net and an average tonnage of 166.91 tons gross and 143.54 tons net.

The number of vessels sold from the district in 1902 was 13, with a total measurement of 1,156.27 tons gross and 916.58 tons net and an average tonnage of 87.40 tons gross and 70.51 tons net, of which eight were schooners, with a total measurement of 608.17 tons gross and 507.36 tons net and an average tonnage of 76.02 tons gross and 63.42 tons net, one sloop boat, 8.33 tons gross and 8.33 tons net, and three steamers, with a total measurement of 367.70 tons gross and 229.26 tons net, and an average tonnage of 122.57 tons gross and 76.42 tons net.

Losses During the Year.

The total number of vessels belonging to the District lost since the publication of the last list, including one sloop boat of less than five tons which was not registered, was 11, with an aggregate tonnage of 1131.76 tons gross 757.38 tons net, and an average tonnage of 113.17 tons gross and 75.74 tons net, of which ten vessels, with a total tonnage of 1,067.85 tons gross and 696.65 tons net, were employed in the fisheries and one sloop, 63.93 tons gross and 60.73 tons net was employed in the stone coasting trade. The vessels with their outfits were valued at \$127,300 on which there was an insurance of \$93,994.

Four of the vessels lost were employed in the Newfoundland herring fishery, two were engaged in mackerel seining, two in shore codfishing and one each in the Banks halibut fishery and in the haddock fishery.

For the first time since 1892 and the second time since 1883 and for many years preceding, no vessel has sailed from port and never been heard from or has been lost during the year with her entire crew, and the loss of life from other causes has been much below the average. The total number of men lost, including deaths on shipboard or in hospitals and sailors drowned at the wharves has been 25, leaving four widows and 19 children.

Of the men lost, six were drowned by the capsizing of their dories on the Banks, four were washed overboard and two fell overboard from their vessels, two went astray from their vessels on the Banks and were never heard from, two died on shipboard, two died in hospitals, one was killed by falling from the wharf to the vessel, and five were drowned at the wharves in attempting to board their vessel.

For the preceding year the number of vessels lost was six, with total tonnage 738.35 tons gross and 526.81 tons net, and an average tonnage of 126.06 tons gross and 87.80 tons net, valued at \$66,500 and insured for \$55,098. The total number of lives lost during the year was 76, leaving 20 widows and 54 fatherless children.

Sch. ANGLO SAXON, 104.90 tons gross, 72.40 tons net, built in Essex in 1899, and owned by Cunningham & Thompson, went

ashore on Noddy Island, N. S., November 24, 1903, and sank after being got off by her crew, while bound for Yarmouth, N. S., while on a Bank halibuting trip. Crew saved. Valued with outfit at \$11,000 and insured by the Gloucester Mutual Fishing Insurance Company for \$6520 on the vessel and \$2500 on outfit.

Steamer ALICE M. JACOBS, 221.83 tons gross, 88.51 tons net, built in Essex in 1902, and owned by Capt. Solomon Jacobs, went ashore at Cape Ray, N. F., December 15, in consequence of losing her propeller, while on a frozen herring voyage to Newfoundland. Crew saved. Valued with outfit at \$40,000 and insured for \$25,000 by the China Mutual Insurance Company of Boston.

Sch. NAVAHOE, 133.10 tons gross, 91.11 tons net, built in this city in 1900, and owned by Sylvanus Smith & Co., went ashore at Port Dufferin, N. S., December 21, while engaged in the haddock fishery. Crew saved. Valued with outfit at \$13,000 and insured by the Gloucester Mutual Fishing Insurance Company for \$7872 on the vessel and \$2000 on outfit.

Sch. INDEPENDENCE, 137.25 tons gross, 102.15 tons net, built in Essex in 1901, and owned by Gardner & Parsons, wrecked at Schooner Pond Point, C. B., December 27, while on the way home from a frozen herring trip to the Bay of Islands, N. F. Crew saved. Valued with cargo at \$18,500, insured for \$7,872 on the vessel and \$4000 on the outfit by the Gloucester Mutual Fishing Insurance Company, and \$2000 on the vessel and \$2000 on the outfit by the China Mutual Insurance Company.

Sch. FERNWOOD, 130.78 tons gross, 96.47 tons net, built in Essex in 1887, and owned by David B. Smith & Co., was caught in the ice off Cape Weibold, on the passage home from Bay of Islands, N. F., with a cargo of frozen herring January 19, and was abandoned by the crew January 24, who escaped to the shore five miles away on the ice. Valued with cargo at \$8500, and insured by the Gloucester Mutual Fishing Insurance Company for \$4388 on the vessel and \$4000 on the cargo and outfit.

Sloop boat FANNIE BELLE (formerly sch. boat Edmund S.), unregistered, being less than five tons measurement, built at Rockland, Me., in 1897, and owned by John Mosetic, went ashore at Magnolia January 26. Crew saved. Valued at \$1000 and insured for \$700 by the China Mutual Insurance Company.

Sch. LIZZIE M. STANWOOD, 105.58 tons gross, 76.70 tons net, built in Essex in 1889, and owned by Davis Bros., went ashore on Cape Sable island February 14 while returning from New-

foundland with a cargo of frozen herring. Crew saved. Valued at \$8000 and insured for \$3846 on the vessel and \$2500 on the outfits by the Gloucester Mutual Fishing Insurance Company.

Sch. boat MAUD WHITMORE, 11.43 tons gross, 10.56 tons net, built in Bucksport, Me., in 1877, and owned by the Independent Herring Company, lost on Horseshoe ledge, off Southwest Harbor, Me., March 11. Crew saved. Valued at \$700 and insured for \$600 by the China Mutual Insurance Company.

Sch. RIVAL, 122.79 tons gross, 91.60 tons net, built in Essex in 1902, and owned by Hugh Parkhurst & Co., wrecked off Brigantine Shoal, off the New Jersey coast April 8, while on a fresh mackerel seining trip. Crew saved. Valued at \$17,000 and insured for \$8195 on the vessel and \$2000 on the outfits by the Gloucester Mutual Fishing Insurance Company.

Sch. HARRY G. FRENCH, 100.17 tons gross, 67.15 tons net, built in Essex in 1884, and owned by John Chisholm, run down and sunk by the steamer Deutschland off South Shoal lightship June 30. Crew saved. Valued at \$9600 and insured for \$4500 on the vessel and \$4000 on the outfits by the Gloucester Mutual Fishing Insurance Company.

JOHN LEYDEN, 58 years old, native of Ireland, single, one of the crew of sch Arthur D. Story, found drowned in the dock at Parkhurst's wharf January 9.

ALMON NICKERSON, 29 years old, native of Woods Harbor, N. S., one of the crew of sch. Corona, drowned on the Grand Banks January 11. Lest widow and one child.

Capt. JOHN ANDERSON, 43 years old, native of Sweden, master of sch. Titania, fell overboard from the schooner January 18, while sounding on Georges. Left widow and six children.

WILLIAM SULLIVAN, 31 years old, native of this city, single, washed overboard from sch. Madonna on Green Bank Jan. 19.

AMOS SMITH, 23 years old, native of Port Matoun, N. S., single, washed overboard from sch. Jennie B. Hodgdon on the passage home from Cashes February 22.
