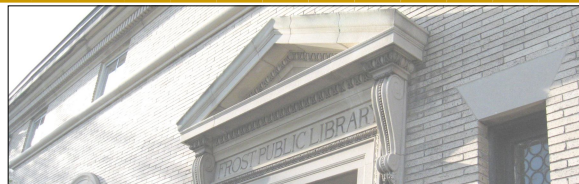

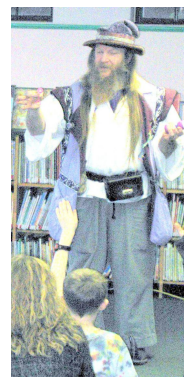
and frolick.

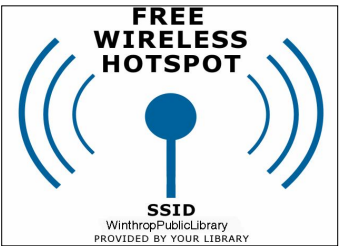
